## 2025 Youth Tour Application Process Open

**SINCE 1958**, electric cooperatives across the country have been sending young people to the nation's capital for a weeklong study tour. Once again this year, Lamar Electric Cooperative will send two students from our area on a trip of a lifetime.

These students will participate in the Government-in-Action Youth Tour, an all-expenses-paid trip that will start in Austin and take them to Washington, D.C. Youth Tour participants will visit the U.S. Capitol, meet with members of Congress and tour many historical sites, monuments and museums.

#### Who Is Eligible?

Tenth, 11th, and 12th grade students who live full-time in a residence served by Lamar EC or attend one of the three high schools served by Lamar Electric, which are Prairiland, Detroit and Faith Christian. Homeschooled students served by Lamar Electric are also eligible.

#### How To Apply

Go to lamarelectric.coop/youth and complete the 2025 Youth Tour application, which includes the following:

- **2.** Written essay on this year's topic: "Should electric linemen be considered first responders? Why or why not?" The essay must be two pages, double-spaced with a 12-point font and 1-inch margins.

The application and essay must both be received no later than 5 p.m. January 31. Final selections will be announced by February 21. ■



## Annual Meeting Set for April 26

LAMAR ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE will hold its annual meeting at 10 a.m. Saturday, April 26, at the cooperative headquarters, 5225 U.S. Highway 82 E. in Blossom. There will be additional information in *Texas Co-op Power* regarding the meeting over the next few months.

Three positions on the board of directors are up for election each year, and this year, districts 5, 6 and 7 will be voting for their directors at the annual meeting.

Members residing in districts 5, 6 and 7 who wish to be a candidate for one of the available board positions must appear in person at the main office of the cooperative and fill out a nomination form between January 26 and February 25, as outlined in the co-op's bylaws. If you're unsure of which district you live in, please refer to the district map below.

#### Lamar Electric Cooperative Bylaws Excerpt

**ARTICLE III. SECTION 3. Qualifications.** No person shall be eligible to become a board member of the cooperative who:


- a) Has not been a member of the cooperative for at least one year prior to nomination;
- b) Has not been a bona fide resident of the board district for which seeking election for at least one year prior to nomination:
- c) Is any way employed by or financially interested in a competing enterprise or a business selling electric energy or supplies to the cooperative;
- d) Is an employee of this cooperative or has been terminated from the cooperative less than five years;
- e) Is a close relative of an employee or an employee's spouse ("close" being defined as wife, husband, grandparent, grand-child, parent, child, brother, sister, stepparent, stepchild, step-

brother, stepsister, father-in-law, mother-in-law, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, brother-in-law, and/or sister-in-law);

- f) Has been convicted, pleaded guilty or plead "no contest" to a felony; or
- g) Is an incumbent of, or candidate for, an elective public office for which a salary is paid.
- h) Current account credit with Lamar Electric must be in good standing.
  - No person shall be eligible to remain a board member who: a) Is not a member of the cooperative;
  - b) Is not a bona fide resident of the district for which elected;
- c) Is any way employed by or financially interested in a competing enterprise or a business selling electric energy or supplies to the cooperative;
- d) Is an employee of this cooperative or has been terminated from the cooperative less than five years;
- e) Is a close relative of an employee or an employee's spouse ("close" being defined as wife, husband, grandparent, grandchild, parent, child, brother, sister, stepparent, stepchild, stepbrother, stepsister, father-in-law, mother-in-law, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, brother-in-law, and/or sister-in-law);
- f) Has been convicted, pleaded guilty or plead "no contest" to a felony; or
- g) Is an incumbent of, or candidate for, an elective public office for which a salary is paid.

Upon establishment of the fact that a board member is holding office in violation of any of the foregoing provisions, the board shall remove such board member.

Nothing contained in this section shall affect in any manner whatsoever the validity of any action taken at any meeting of the board or at any special or annual meeting of the members.



# Lamar Electric Cooperative 2025 Scholarship Application

LAMAR ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE will award 10 \$1,500 scholar-ships to students who plan to pursue an academic degree or certification from an accredited university, college, junior college, technical school or other postsecondary educational institution. Scholarship payment will be made directly to the institution in one lump sum and must be used within two years of the award date. Funds may be used for tuition, books, and room and board.

Eligibility

To be considered for a Lamar Electric scholarship a student must:

- ▶ Live full time in a residence served by Lamar Electric Cooperative
- Be a graduating senior attending a high school or an accredited homeschool program within the counties served by the cooperative.
- ▶ Apply by April 4.

Winners will be chosen in a random drawing at the Lamar Electric Annual Membership Meeting on Saturday, April 26. You do not need to be present to win.

## Why Electric Co-ops Replace Utility Poles

YOU PROBABLY DON'T pay much attention to the utility poles throughout Lamar Electric Cooperative's service territory, but did you know they're the backbone of our distribution network?

Strong, sturdy poles ensure a reliable electrical system, which is why we routinely inspect the poles on our lines. Throughout the year, our crews check for decay caused by exposure to the elements. They know which poles are oldest and conduct inspections through a rotational process. Typically, a standard wooden distribution pole is expected to last more than 50 years.

Occasionally, poles need to be replaced for reasons besides decay and old age. Weather disasters, power line relocation and car crashes are potential causes for immediate replacement.

When possible, Lamar EC communicates when and where pole replacements will take place so you stay informed of where crews will be working. Here's a quick breakdown of how crews replace a utility pole.

Crews will start the process by digging a hole, typically next to the pole being replaced. The depth of the hole must be 15% of the new pole's height.

Next, the new pole must be fitted with bolts, cross arms, insulators, ground wires and arm braces—all of the necessary hardware for delivering safe, reliable electricity. Then crews safely detach the power lines from the old pole. The new pole is then raised and guided carefully into position, and the lines are attached, leaving the new pole to do its job.

So the next time you come across a Lamar EC crew replacing a pole, use caution and know that this process ensures a more reliable electric system for you, our members.
